

IN OUR SCHOOLS

This year, LCS promoted holistic growth in every facet of our work. From inventive new programs to increased interconnectivity across grade levels, here are just some of the ways LCS accelerated excellence and innovation.

A YEAR OF NEW BEGINNINGS FOR CTE

The Career and Technical Education (CTE) program at LCS made great strides in the 2022-23 school year. Through this program, LCS secondary students receive hands-on experience in career fields like carpentry, machining, automotive technology, culinary arts, cosmetology, and cybersecurity.

The number of LCS students enrolled in the CTE Academy at Central Virginia Community College (CVCC) has more than doubled since last year. This program allows students to take college CTE classes on CVCC's campus for free, receiving dual university and high school credit. Starting next year, 11th and 12th graders will have the opportunity to take all their CTE and core classes through CVCC for free, thanks to a grant from the VDOE.

This year, participation in student career readiness organizations has seen a dramatic increase. Heritage and E. C. Glass high schools formed Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) chapters. Both schools will reactivate their Health Occupations Students of America (HOSA) and SkillsUSA chapters this coming year.



MIDDLE SCHOOLS INTRODUCE PRE-AP ARTS COURSES

All three LCS middle schools added new College Board Pre-Advanced Placement (AP) arts classes for eighth graders in the 2023-24 school year. Dunbar and Linkhorne middle schools introduced Pre-AP Theatre, and Sandusky Middle School introduced Pre-AP Visual Arts. These courses help students earn high-school credit early, bolster grade-point averages, and provide a gateway to AP for students who might not otherwise consider taking advanced classes.



Thanks to a new football talent pipeline program, aspiring high school football players across the division will get the academic support and accountability, scheduling help, and parent involvement they need to succeed starting in eighth grade. E. C. Glass High School is working with Linkhorne Middle coaches to instill Virginia High School League (VHSL) standards early. A similar program is in the works between Sandusky Middle and Heritage High School, and both schools are working with Dunbar Middle.

Coaches at both high schools are inviting middle schoolers to out-of-season workouts and mentoring middle school coaches. When student-athletes reach the high schools, they'll be greeted with upgraded weight rooms and new training equipment.

Middle school sports enjoyed an innovative year, too.

Sandusky Middle formed a cross-country team and plans to add tennis next. Linkhorne Middle built a brand-new fence around their track and will receive a new set of bleachers this year. All three middle schools



came together to develop the Lynchburg City Softball, the division's first softball program for sixth through eighth graders. The team's first season will begin in the spring of 2024.

INTRODUCING LCS RESTORE

In the 2022-23 school year, the division launched LCS Restore, a holistic program empowering students to succeed academically and emotionally through restorative practices. Guided by healthy relationship-building between educators and students, the program aims to help students change harmful behavior and build lifelong skills.

Funded by the Department of Education's School-Based Mental Health (SBMH) grant program, the Restorative Suspension Center opened in February. This alternative to traditional short-term suspension helps secondary students keep up academically when suspended instead of missing school, preventing chronic absenteeism.

Students transitioning into kindergarten, first, sixth, and ninth grade who need additional behavioral support can attend the Elementary and Secondary Restorative Academies. These help students develop the social and emotional skills necessary for success before

transitioning to their base schools over a 6-9-week intensive period. The kindergarten program opened in the 2022-23 school year, and the secondary and first-grade programs will launch in the 2023-24 school year.

academic achievement. Every nine weeks, the teams participate in a cross-curricular, project-based learning opportunity. Each student has a personalized learning plan, and social-emotional learning curriculum is embedded into instruction.

ROSETTE ACADEMY HELPS STUDENTS TRANSITION INTO MIDDLE SCHOOL

LCS introduced the Linkhorne Middle School Rosette Academy in 2023 to help sixth graders transition from elementary school to middle school while developing important academic and social-emotional skills.

All sixth-grade students operate on an altered block schedule with no bells. Students are separated into two teams, each with a teacher in English, math, science, and social studies. The team camaraderie and separation from seventh and eighth graders create a supportive small-school atmosphere.

The Rosette Academy implements intentional learning strategies based on student feedback to promote





NEW PROGRAM EMPOWERS ASPIRING TEACHERS

Aspiring educators in Lynchburg now have more opportunities than ever to become licensed teachers, thanks to the new LCS Classified Teacher Program. The initiative offers an alternative route for those with bachelor's degrees to gain invaluable classroom experience while pursuing their provisional teaching license. More than 30 classified teachers have been hired since the program launched in August 2023.

Supported by experienced mentors, classified teachers take on all the responsibilities of a licensed teacher. They're hired full-time with comprehensive benefits and compensated at the 90th percentile of the current starting teacher salary. Bringing fresh talent into the division, it's an accessible answer to traditional teacher preparation programs.





CTE STUDENTS EARN NATIONAL ACCLAIM

Five Linkhorne Middle School students earned national honors at the Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) National Leadership and Recognition Conference in Denver, Colorado in July. Each competitor identified an issue concerning families, careers, or communities; researched their chosen topic; and developed and implemented a project to move toward positive change.

Anna Boyers placed second in the nation in entrepreneurship. Addisyn Cruz and Jordyn Cordova placed second in the nation in the sustainability challenge. KaDerrah Bright was named a national finalist in National Programs in Action, and Katherine Lasitter earned a silver medal in career investigation.

AN EXPERIMENT OF INTERNATIONAL PROPORTIONS

Heritage High School junior Micajah Mason represented LCS at the Regeneron International Science and Engineering Fair (ISEF) in Dallas, Texas in May. His project, entitled "The Effect of Degradation on a Full Synthetic versus Conventional Motor Lubricant's Tribological Performance," tests which type of motor oil can perform for longer in a car engine before breaking down and causing drops in performance.

Mason qualified for the international competition when he was named the Grand Award Finalist in Physical Sciences at the Central Virginia Regional Science Fair. E. C. Glass High junior Lilly Wood won the Grand Alternate Award in Biological Sciences. Both were among the seven LCS students who advanced to the state competition.

A long-standing Lynchburg tradition, the exhibition has opened annually for 12 years. On the other side of town, Lynchburg Regional Airport displayed artwork by 12 T. C. Miller Elementary School for Innovation students in November for National Aviation Month.





LCS ATHLETES MAKING HISTORY

The Heritage High wrestling team won the Region 3C wrestling championship in February, becoming the first LCS team to secure a regional grappling title. Across town, the E. C. Glass boys basketball team was named the VHSL Class 4 runners-up after making it to the state competition for the first time since 1967.





DUNBAR THEATRE STUDENTS WIN NATIONAL AWARDS

Thirty-three theatre students from Dunbar won a national Freddie G. Excellence in Ensemble Work award at the Junior Theatre Festival (JTF) in Atlanta, GA in January. The award recognizes the group's skills in singing, dancing, acting, and teamwork. Students Haven Manning and Will Hoffman were named JTF All-Stars for their individual performances.

HURDLING TO VICTORY

The Heritage High indoor girls and boys teams dominated at the Class 3 state indoor track championships in February. Akera Molette placed first in the state in the 55-meter hurdles, high jump, and triple jump. Jaidyn Johnson placed first in the 55-meter and 300-meter dashes. Marquis White placed first in the 55-meter hurdles.




OPERATING BUDGET

2022-23 OPERATING BUDGET




AMENDED OPERATING BUDGET REVENUE

NEW HORIZONS

With the help of grant funding, LCS invested in safety, mental health, academics, and more over the past year. Here are a few of the ways these contributions helped our school division shine.

CLASSROOM INNOVATION

Since its inception, the LCS
Education Foundation has
awarded more than \$1.2 million
in Classroom Innovation Grant
funding to support teachers' out-ofthe-box learning initiatives across
the division. Last year, more than
\$80,000 in grant funding enabled
students to produce and perform
original music, explore science
through outdoor experiences and
gardening projects, try their hands
at vocational careers, experience
local history through the play
"Buried Deep," and more.

MUSIC

Sandusky Middle School's band program will soon receive new musical instruments, thanks to The Mr. Holland's Opus Foundation, a national organization supporting music education in schools. The grant will provide 18 brass, woodwind, and percussion instruments valued at \$25,390 in total. This contribution will allow more LCS students to experience the benefits of music education. In addition to this grant, LCS schools received nearly \$300k for new musical instruments over the past school year.

TRANSPORTATION SUSTAINABILITY

LCS is slated to receive \$9.8 million in federal funding to purchase 25 electric school buses. A crucial step toward the LCS commitment to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, this funding was made possible through the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act.

SAFETY

LCS launched a School Security Officer (SSO) program in its elementary schools in February, funded by a four-year grant



through the Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services. SSOs are retired law enforcement officers whose extensive field experience and school-specific training equip them to protect staff and students. Three SSOs were hired in 2023, and soon, each of the 16 elementary schools in the division will have an SSO. The program will bring elementary schools the same level of protection afforded to secondary schools, each of which has a dedicated School Resource Officer.

As SSOs work to keep LCS elementary schools safe, a new safety initiative is brewing at E. C. Glass High School. In partnership with LCS and the LPD, the volunteer-led committee Safe Schools Lynchburg started raising funds for their pilot "Every Second Counts" project in June 2023. The organization plans to install security film on school windows. In the event of an emergency, this added defense mechanism would give those inside the building more time to recognize the threat and take appropriate safety measures.

MENTORSHIP

Launched in June 2022 with funding from the Coronavirus
Aid, Relief, and Economic Security
(CARES) Act, the P'Awesome
Leadership mentoring program at
Linkhorne Middle School is helping
students excel academically and
behaviorally despite lingering
impacts from the COVID-19
pandemic. The program connects
students with local adults who are
active in youth organizations like
the Young Women's Empowerment
Academy and the Jubilee Family
Development Center.

Mentors form supportive relationships with the students through regular check-ins, weekly group meals, and collaborative art projects. In May 2023, the group created three full-sized murals and one geometric sculpture that have become permanent installations on Linkhorne Middle's campus, encouraging the student body with positive messages.

MENTAL HEALTH

In January, LCS secured \$8.4 million in funding from the Department of Education's School-Based Mental Health (SBMH) grant program. LCS will

use these funds over the next five years to hire and retain skilled professionals to support student mental health needs, including a Board Certified Behavioral Analyst (BCBA), four Registered Behavior Technicians (RBT), two school social workers, and eight Restorative Clinicians (QMHP-Cs). The grant also covers retention bonuses for current mental health professionals, contracted services, and professional development.

With this funding, LCS opened the Restorative Suspension Center (RSC) in February. An alternative to traditional short-term suspension, the program allows middle and high school students to continue focusing on their academic progress instead of missing school.

In September, LCS received the three-year Student, Teachers, and Officers Preventing (STOP)
School Violence grant from the U. S. Bureau of Justice Assistance, which will help further the division's emphasis on restorative practices.
Providing nearly a million dollars in funding, the grant will fund restorative behavior training for teachers as well as three restorative interventionist positions in LCS alternative schools.














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
